2013 Enrolments

Although the 2012 school year has only just started, my diary has already become very busy with enrolment interviews for the 2013 school year. Good numbers of students have already been enrolled in Prep/Kinder and Year 7 – traditionally our major intake years.

I take this opportunity to urge current parents who might be planning to enrol any siblings at the College in 2013 to contact my Personal Assistant, Ms Heather Watson to make an appointment for an enrolment interview and to begin the process of completing the enrolment forms and sending these through in the lead up to this interview. It would be a terrible situation for current parents to miss the opportunity to enrol their next child on the misunderstanding that they had plenty of time to initiate and complete the enrolment process. Demands for positions are very strong, particularly in Kinder at the Albury campus and therefore it is imperative that parents begin this process to avoid disappointment!

The College enrolment policies do not have any preferential treatment for current families. In this context, I hasten to add that of course we welcome the enrolment of the siblings of current students but we do not presume that this will occur automatically. Therefore it is important that we hear from parents sooner rather than later so that we can book in the enrolments before vacancies disappear in certain year levels.

NSW Governor's Visit to Albury

Earlier this week the College Captains, Laura Slabbert, James Walsh and I had the honour of meeting with and having lunch with the Governor of NSW, Her Excellency Professor Marie Bashir. The Governor's visit had been instigated and organised by Fr Peter McLeod-Miller friend of Trinity and Parish Priest of St Matthew's Parish in Albury. The Governor had been invited to spend some time in Albury meeting and talking with the youth of Albury and to discuss the challenges and opportunities which face the young people of the region. School Captains from several High Schools in Albury were in attendance and Her Excellency did not miss the opportunity to talk with these young people and provide them with an opportunity to express their views on a range of important subjects.

The evening event also showcased a number of musical items from young Albury musicians who were all very well received.

If a student is leaving from Alexandra Park and not returning to school they must have presented their Pastoral Care Tutor with a note from their parents giving permission to do so, prior to the day. Any student who does not have a note or says that their parents have given permission verbally will not be allowed to leave from the carnival and will be expected to return to school via the buses.



In the past the Athletics carnival has been a very positive event with many students willingly participating in many events. This often leads to presentations having to be completed at school in the following days. It has also become quite apparent that many students appreciate the opportunity to represent their House. NATIONAL ASSESSMENT PROGRAM
Literacy and Numeracy

for the **National Assessment Program - Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN)**. The main purpose of NAPLAN is to assess the literacy and numeracy learning of students in all Australian schools. The results of these tests will provide important information for teachers and parents. In particular, they will help inform teachers in their ongoing efforts to address the literacy and numeracy needs of their students. The national assessment is designed to provide information on student performance across a number of levels of achievement. Background information is collected as part of the National Assessment Program. This information is treated confidentially and held securely to ensure that every student's right to privacy is maintained.

The tests will be held from **Tuesday 15 May - Thursday 17 May 2012**. We would expect all of our students in those identified year levels to complete the tests.

Parents do have the right to **withdraw** their child. Withdrawals are intended to address issues associated with religious beliefs or philosophical objections to testing. These matters should be considered in consultation with the Principal and a signed consent form is required before a withdrawal is confirmed by the Australian Curriculum Assessment and Reporting Authority.

Students with **confirmed disabilities** or difficulties in learning are expected to participate in the tests. Access to special provisions and exemption from the tests must be discussed with the school's Learning Support Team and the school Principal, and a parent consent form must be signed.

During the latter part of Term 3 parents will receive reports about their child's performance on these nationally benchmarked tests. Parents might like to view sample test materials that are available at www.naplan.edu.au, and discuss the tests with their children. The NSW Ministry of Health has been informed that a small number of Parent Information Kits which contain forms for parents to read and sign for school vaccination may be **missing important information**.

Please check that all information is included in the Parent Information Kits:

- parents of **Year 7 female students** should receive a pink **Year 7 Girls** shrink-wrapped pack that includes 4 envelopes, each containing a *Consent Form* and *Information for you and your child* sheet:
 - 1) a pink Human Papillomavirus (HPV) envelope
 - 2) a blue Diphtheria-Tetanus-Pertussis (dTpa) envelope
 - 3) a green Hepatitis B envelope
 - 4) a yellow Varicella (chicken pox) envelope
- parents of **Year 7 male students** should receive a blue **Year 7 Boys** shrink-wrapped pack that includes 3 envelopes, each containing a *Consent Form* and *Information for you and your child* sheet:
 - 1) a blue Diphtheria-Tetanus-Pertussis (dTpa) envelope
 - 2) a green Hepatitis B envelope
 - 3) a yellow Varicella (chicken pox) envelope
- parents of **Year 10 male and female students** should receive a blue Diphtheria-Tetanus-Pertussis (dTpa) envelope that contains a *Consent Form* and *Information for you and your child* sheet.

If all the information is included and you would like your child to be vaccinated, please read the *Information for you and your child* sheet, sign the *Consent Form* and return the signed *Consent Form* to your child's school. If you do NOT wish your child to be vaccinated, do NOT complete or return the *Consent Form*.

If any information is missing from your Parent Information Kit, please contact your child's school immediately and a replacement Kit will be provided.


Careers Fast Tracks


