Staffing Update

I am pleased to advise the College community of a number of staffing appointments leading into the 2015 school year. 4. Ms Melanie Routledge – Junior School teacher at the Albury campus. Ms Routledge originates from near the Lakes District in northern England. She commenced her teaching career in the UK before moving to Sydney several years ago where she has been teaching in a number of State primary schools;
5. Mrs Kimberley Graetz – teacher of Mathematics in the Senior School. Mrs Graetz is an experienced teacher who has enjoyed great success teaching in State secondary schools in the north-east of Victoria in recent years. Mrs Graetz has also taken on important pastoral care roles in her schools and is looking forward to joining staff at Trinity next year;
6. Ms Kerrie Wheeler – Junior School teacher at the Wodonga campus. Ms Wheeler has been teaching locally for a number of years now and brings a diligent student focus to her work in and out of the classroom.
7. Ms Renee Vanegmond – Junior School teacher at the Albury campus. Ms Vanegmond has impressed the College via her work as a relief teacher in recent months and I am looking forward to her taking on a more permanent role at the College in 2015.

Careful in the use of word...




